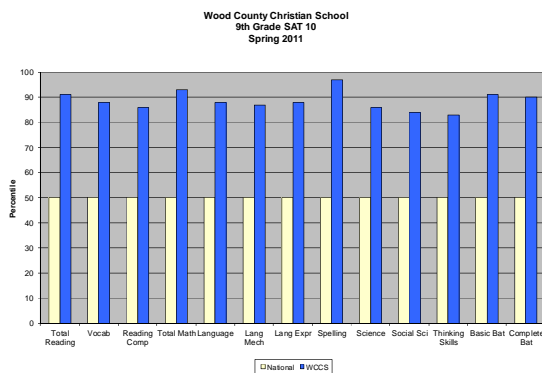
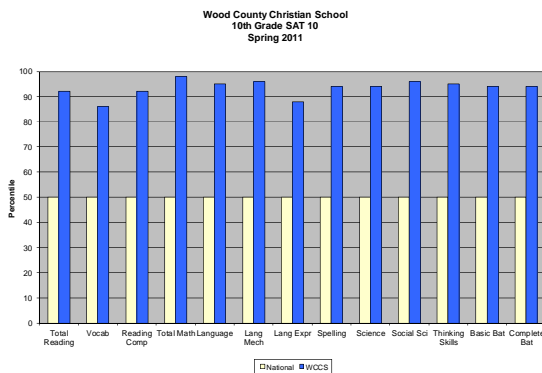
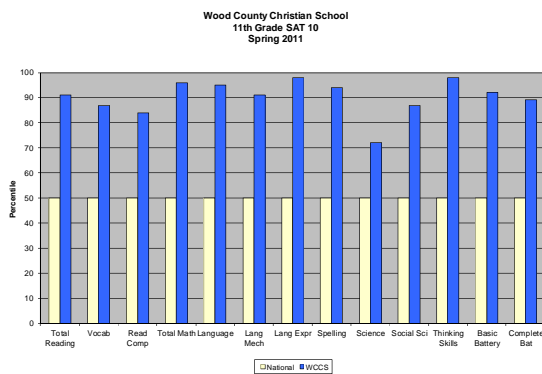

## ACADEMIC HONORS

# Academics at WCCS

The academic program at Wood County Christian School offers families a strong curriculum to prepare their children well for college and career choices. Students who remain in our program will normally score well above the averages for public schools on achievement tests. Some of our academic development goals include:

1. To help students reach their full academic potential by providing a developmentally appropriate instructional program with high academic standards (Isaiah 28:9-10, Col. 3:23-24, Heb. 5:13-14).
2. To teach students to use good study habits to enhance their creative and critical thinking (II Tim. 2:15, Prov. 4:5-12).
3. To develop in students independent study habits and foster in students a life-long love for learning and personal excellence (Prov. 4:5-8).
4. To help students interpret and apply all knowledge from a Biblical perspective (Isaiah 8:20, I John 4:1) and interpret changing world events from a Biblical worldview (Heb. 13:8).
5. To prepare students for future educational or vocational experiences by developing in them the necessary communication, thinking, and technological skills needed to be successful (Prov. 4:5-12).

Some elective courses require prerequisite classes be taken, i.e. Algebra II before Algebra III. Some courses may be offered every other year, but require a sufficient level of interest/ability to be established, i.e. French III.

Students in grades 11 & 12 have opportunities for a wide range of **on campus** choices via **Individual Study Electives (ISE)** and **off campus** electives through the **Advanced Enrollment Programs (AEP)** at the local colleges. These electives must have the approval of parents and the school administration, working together for the best academic plan for the student, as they pursue their college/career choice. Juniors may take a maximum of one off-campus, school day class each quarter or semester. Seniors may take a maximum of two. These classes may be used only as substitutes for Arts & Careers (total 4) and not core classes.
